A light supper will follow the 5 p.m. Mass. The movie, "The Lady In The Van," will begin at 6:45 p.m.

The Lady in the Van tells the true story of Alan Bennett's strained friendship with Miss Mary Shepherd, an eccentric homeless woman whom Bennett befriended before allowing her temporarily to park her van in the driveway of his home. She stayed there for 15 years. As the story develops Bennett learns that Miss Shepherd is really Margaret Fairchild, a former gifted pupil of the pianist Alfred Cortot. She had played Chopin in a promenade concert, tried to become a nun, was committed to an institution by her brother, escaped, had an accident when her van was hit by a motorcyclist for which she believed herself to blame, and thereafter lived in fear of arrest.

During her 15 year stay in his drive, Bennett balances his writing career with providing for Shepherd and watching over his increasingly invalid mother. Though he denies "caring" for anyone, he slowly becomes aware of his growing friendship with Miss Shepherd. Please plan to join us.

Purgatory

Purgatory is not, as Tertullian thought, some kind of supraworldly concentration camp where one is forced to undergo punishments in a more or less arbitrary fashion. Rather it is the inwardly necessary process of transformation in which a person becomes capable of Christ, capable of God and thus capable of

unity with the whole communion of saints. Simply to look at people with any degree of realism at all is to grasp the necessity of such a process. It does not replace grace by works, but allows the former to achieve its full victory precisely as grace. What actually saves is the full assent of faith. But in most of us, that basic option is buried under a great deal of wood, hay and straw. Only with difficulty can it peer out from behind the latticework of an egoism we are powerless to pull down with our own hands. Man is the recipient of the divine mercy, yet this does not exonerate him from the need to be transformed. Encounter with the Lord is this transformation. It is the fire that burns away our dross and reforms us to be vessels of eternal joy. ~ Pope Benedict XVI, Eschatology, CCC # 1031- 1032



Forgiveness Must Be Passed On

Christ makes our being forgiven by him contingent on our forgiving others: "For if you forgive men their trespass-

es, your heavenly Father also will forgive you; but if you do not forgive men their trespasses, neither will your Father forgive your trespasses" (Mt 6:14 - 15).

Our refusal to forgive - to do this first deed of charity - will, quite simply, send us to hell unless we repent of it. Why is this? It is not that God refuses to give forgiveness to us until we forgive but that we *cannot receive* forgiveness from God if we have unforgiving hearts.
