te that, "The Church forcefully maintains this link between life ethics and social ethics, fully aware that a society lacks solid foundations when, on the one hand, it asserts values such as the dignity of the person, justice and peace, but then, on the other hand, radically acts to the contrary by allowing or tolerating a variety of ways in which human life is devalued and violated, especially where it is weak or marginalized." As a gift from God, every human life is sacred from conception to natural death. The life and dignity of every person must be respected and protected at every stage and in every condition. The right to life is the first and most fundamental principle of human rights that leads Catholics to actively work for a world of greater respect for human life and greater commitment to justice and peace. Confirmation Enrolment Weekend & St. Patrick Parish Prayer Partners

The sacrament of Confirmation gives to its recipient an out-



pouring of the grace and power of the Holy Spirit, so that the person can witness to his or her discipleship in Christ with the seven fold gifts of God's life. It is the sacrament of Baptism that is being confirmed, fortifying every confirmandi to stand firm in faith, grow in hope and become a person of Christian charity in the world.

On the weekend of **November 24 - 25** the grade 7 students at all four parish schools will formally begin a programme of formation for the reception of the sacrament of Confirmation.

This year, as a way to support and pray for these students as they prepare to complete their Christian initiation we are asking that interested parishioners take a student name card from the basket in the narthex which will be made available on the enrolment weekend. By taking a student name card the parishioner will become a **Prayer Partner** for the student. The parishioner will be responsible for praying for the confirmandi throughout their sacramental formation. In addition to praying for the confirmandi the parishioner should also offer prayers for the entire confirmation team consisting of the student's family, sponsor, Fr. Bill, Deacon Terry and their individual classroom teachers.



The Feast of the Dedication of the Lateran Basilica

A most unusual feast. The Lateran Basilica is the Cathedral of the Diocese of Rome, an ancient church first built near the walls of the city of Rome by the Em-

peror Constantine at the beginning of the fourth century. Every Diocese in the world celebrates the feast of the dedication of their own Cathedral, since the cathedral is the mother and head of all the churches in the Diocese. The Lateran Basilica, since it is the place where the Pope has his cathedra or Episcopal throne, has the title Mother and Head of all the Churches of the City and the World. This year the feast will be celebrated on Friday, November 9. On this day we both celebrate and pray for the unity of those churches gathered in communion with the successor of Saint Peter. The marbles and mosaics of the Lateran, which together form a splendid and beautiful building, are a sign of the beauty of God's family, the Church, gathered in worship as the living stones of the temple of the Lord. This is a day to reflect on how this building, and cathedrals and churches everywhere, are not just meeting-places but visible signs to the world of the Body of Christ in prayer.
