THE HOLY FAMILY

Today we commemorate the fact that God chose to be born and raised in the same environment as all men, when He could have chosen otherwise. We can do no better than to reflect on the beautiful and profound words of Pope Benedict XVI in his message for the 2008 World Day of Peace:

"The first form of communion between persons is that born of the love of a man and a woman who decide to enter a stable union in order to build together a new family...The natural family, as an intimate communion of life and love, based on marriage between a man and a woman, constitutes "the primary place of 'humanization' for the person and society," and a "cradle of life and love"...Indeed, in a healthy family life we experience some of the fundamental elements of peace: justice and love between brothers and sisters, the role of authority expressed by parents, loving concern for the members who are weaker because of youth, sickness or old age, mutual help in the necessities of life, readiness to accept others and, if necessary, to forgive them. For this reason, the family is the first and indispensable teacher of peace...Where can young people gradually learn to savor the genuine "taste" of peace better than in the original "nest" which nature prepares for them?...This point merits special reflection: everything that serves to weaken the family based on the marriage of a man and a woman, everything that directly or indirectly stands in the way of its openness to the responsible acceptance of a new life, everything that obstructs its right to be primarily responsible for the education of its children, constitutes an objective obstacle on the road to peace."

SOLEMNITY OF MARY, MOTHER OF GOD

The Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God, commemorates the divine motherhood of the Blessed Virgin Mary, Mother of our Lord and God, Jesus Christ. This is a Holy Day of Obligation for Catholics. A mass of celebration will take place at St. Patrick's Parish on New Year's Eve, Friday, December 31, at 5 p.m. and on New Year's Day, Saturday, January 1, at 9 & 11 a.m.

THE EPIPHANY OF THE LORD

The celebration of the Epiphany of the Lord will take place at St. Patrick's Parish on Sunday, January 2 at 9 & II am. The word Epiphany is from a

Greek word meaning "appearance or manifestation." After being made known to the shepherds of Bethlehem, Christ is revealed to the Magi who have come from the East to adore Him. A popular axiom says, "Wise men (and women) still seek him." Today, we no longer need to travel far to find Jesus, for Christ is always present in his Church, especially in her liturgical celebrations. He is present in the Sacrifice of the Mass, not only in the person of his minister, but especially in the Eucharistic species. By his power he is present in the sacraments so that when anybody baptizes, it is really Christ himself who baptizes. He is present in his word since it is he himself who speaks when the holy Scriptures are read in the Church. Lastly, he is present when the Church prays and sings, for he has promised 'where two or three are gathered together in my name there am I in the midst of them' (cf. CCC 1088).

WORLD DAY OF PEACE

World Day of Peace, celebrated on January I every year, is primarily a Catholic feast day dedicated to universal peace on the Solemnity of Mary, the Mother of

God. On this occasion, Popes generally make authoritative declarations on the Catholic Social Teachings. The theme of the feast has always been about creating a culture of care. The Pope and the Vatican Church stress the need to care and share tolerance for each other, and to create a society that focuses on good moral values and does not yield to the temptation to disregard others. The benefits of a peaceful society have been the emphasis of every year's World Day of Peace since its inception on January 1, 1968.

"Education, work and dialogue between generations: tools for building lasting peace" will be the theme for the January I, 2022 commemoration. As education, work and dialogue are consistently evolving, the Pope's message "proposes an innovative reading that responds to the needs of current and future times." The Pope invites us "to read the signs of the times with the eyes of faith, so that the direction of this change awakens new and old questions with which it is right and necessary to be confronted."
