THE NICENE CREED

The Roman Missal allows for the use of either the Apostles' Creed or the Nicene Creed at Mass. It recommends that Lent and Easter, with their baptismal focus, are especially appropriate times for using the Apostles' Creed. Now that the season of Lent and Easter have come to completion we will again be professing the Nicene Creed at Mass. The Nicene Creed is a summary of the principle truths of our God, given to us by the early Church, and has been passed on to every generation. As we profess and reaffirm the common faith that is the foundation of Christianity, we continue to share in the same truths professed by the early Christians.

Reflecting on Mercy

The works of mercy are charitable actions by which we come to the aid of our neighbour in his spiritual and bodily necessities. When we attend to the needs of those in want, we give them what is theirs, not ours. More than performing works of mercy, we are paying a debt of justice (CCC 2446-2447).

The seven corporal works of mercy:

- I. Feed the hungry.
- 2. Give drink to the thirsty.
- 3. Clothe the naked.
- 4. Shelter the homeless.
- 5. Visit the sick.
- 6. Visit the imprisoned.
- 7. Bury the dead.

The seven spiritual works of mercy:

- I. Counsel the doubtful.
- 2. Instruct the ignorant.
- Admonish sinners.
- 4. Comfort the afflicted.
- 5. Forgive offences.
- 6. Bear wrongs patiently.
- 7. Pray for the living and the dead.

THE CENTRAL MYSTERY OF THE CHRISTIAN FAITH

The Catechism of the Catholic Church describes the Trinity as the "central" mystery of faith. It states, "The mystery of the Most Holy Trinity is the central mystery of Christian faith and life. It is the mystery of God in himself. It is therefore the source of all the other mysteries of faith, the light that enlightens them. It is the most fundamental and essential teaching in the "hierarchy of the truths of faith" [GCD 43]. The whole history of salvation is identical with the history of the way and the means by which the one true God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit, reveals himself to men "and reconciles and unites with himself those who turn away from sin" [GCD 47]" (CCC 234).

DEVOTION TO MARY

The Church's devotion to the Blessed Virgin is intrinsic to Christian worship and so the Church rightly honours the Blessed Virgin with special devotion. By pronouncing her "fiat" at the Annunciation and giving her consent to the Incarnation, Mary was already collaborating with the whole work her Son was to accomplish.

From the most ancient times the Blessed Virgin has been honoured

with the title of "Mother of God" (*Theotokos*) to whose protection the faithful fly in all their dangers and needs...This very special devotion...differs essentially from the adoration which is given to the incarnate Word and equally to the Father and the Holy Spirit and greatly fosters this adoration. We revere all saints with *dulia* (human reverence and devotion) and Mary with *hyperdulia* (the greatest human reverence and devotion), but *latria* (worship and adoration) are given to God alone. (*c.f.* Lumen Gentium 66; CCC 971 - 973, 2083 -2084; Peter Kreeft's, *Catholic Christianity*; *Summa Theologiae* II-II, q. 103, a. 4; III, q. 25, a. 5).

"If the moderns really want a simple religion of love, they must look for it in the Athanasian Creed. The truth is that the trumpet of true Christianity, the challenge of the charities and simplicities of Bethlehem or Christmas Day never rang out more arrestingly and unmistakably than in the defiance of Athanasius to the cold compromise of the Arians. It was emphatically he who really was fighting for a God of Love against a God of colourless and remote cosmic control; the God of the stoics and the agnostics. It was emphatically he who was fighting for the Holy Child against the grey deity of the Pharisees and the Sadducees. He was fighting for that very balance of beautiful interdependence and intimacy, in the very Trinity of the Divine Nature, that draws our hearts to the Trinity of the Holy Family.
